

Electric vehicles vs. cold winter weather



Although winters here in the Sunshine State are mild compared to other parts of the country, we still see occasional moderately frigid temperatures. Did you know that cold weather can have significant impacts on an electric vehicle's driving range?

According to Drive Electric Vermont, the driving range of an electric vehicle could decrease as much as 20% at freezing temperatures (32°F). The decrease in range continues to drop to around 50% at negative temperatures. Fortunately for CHELCO service area residents, this is not typically an issue, but should be something to keep in mind on our colder than usual winter days and when traveling to more frigid climates.

The biggest reason for the decrease in range during cold weather is electric vehicles use battery storage to heat the vehicle for passengers.

This is different from internal combustion engines, which produce heat for warming passengers as a byproduct of operating. Most electric vehicles use a resistance type heat similar to an electric space heater. Some higher-end manufacturers equip their vehicles with heat pumps (a more efficient heating source). Other companies offer the heat pump system as an upgrade ("winter package") or on higher trim level vehicles. Most all manufacturers are equipping electric vehicles with seat heaters and some with steering wheel heaters. This allows the passengers to be more comfortable using less heat, prolonging the range on the battery.
